What are the steps in the Assessment of International Credentials?

- 1. Authenticate documents
- 2. Confirm status/recognition of institutions and programs
- 3. Confirm level of studies and duration of program
- 4. Confirm purpose/outcome of study program
- 5. Compare to similar credentials issued in Canada

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6. Compare education to academic admission requirements for RRC programs

Guidelines for RRC International Credential Assessment

If you are applying to a Red River College (RRC) program and have been educated outside of Canada, you will require an International Credential Assessment. This assessment will analyze and compare education that you have completed outside of Canada with the academic requirements of the RRC program for which you have submitted an application. Please ensure you submit your application well in advance of your program's start date. RRC's International Credential Assessment for admission to RRC programs may take up to three months to complete.

A RRC Admissions Officer/Continuing Education representative will receive and review your application to ensure that you meet program admission requirements (including proof of English proficiency if English is not your first language). The RRC Admissions Officer/Continuing Education Officer will notify you when a RRC International Credential Assessment is required and will provide you with the appropriate form to complete. The RRC International Credential Assessment fee is \$60.90 (in addition to RRC program application fee).

A complete academic history is required for applicants to RRC programs. The RRC International Credential Assessment requires submission of the following:

- · Original transcripts for both secondary (high school) and post-secondary (college or university) education
- Original graduation parchments (certificates, diplomas, degrees) or other documentation of your previous
 education
- Validation of name change if documents reflect a name different than the one provided on your RRC application
- Course outlines/descriptions of post-secondary courses relevant for RRC admission if available

Please note: RRC's International Credential Assessment is for RRC program admission only. All documents to support your application must be in English or French, or certified English translations must be attached. Photocopies or notarized copies are not accepted. If an incomplete academic history is provided, a request for additional documentation will delay your RRC International Credential Assessment.

Processing time for your RRC International Credential Assessment is significantly reduced and the fee is waived when you submit a completed academic credential assessment from one of the approved assessment services listed on the <u>Canadian Information Centre for International Credentials (CICIC) webpage</u>. If you plan to continue your studies at another post-secondary institution following your RRC program graduation, please consider requesting an academic credential assessment from one of the following CICIC approved assessment services:

- World Education Services Canada (WES Canada)
- International Qualifications Assessment Service (IQAS)
- Comparative Education Service (CES)
- International Credential Assessment Services of Canada (ICAS)
- International Credential Evaluation Service (ICES)

Credit Conversion:

Conversion practice commonly used in credential assessments involves adding all possible max marks for a semester and dividing by target Canadian credit hour value to get a conversion factor. The max marks for each course are then divided by the conversion factor to obtain an approximate credit value for the course.

Grading:

Most bachelor's and master's degrees are classified into divisions or classes based on the marks students obtain in the major examinations at the end of each year or semester. Grading scale varies from institution to institution. The Indian system is low marking, with minimum pass mark generally ranging between 33 and 40%, though some institutions or programs adopt a 50% pass. Students who have failed in one or more subjects in a major examination but who have achieved institution-designated minimum marks (e.g. 25%) in the aggregate may be allowed to proceed with their study and make up the failed subjects at a subsequent examination. The following table shows a common grading scale along with conversion to Alberta grades.
